
"The sun, of course, doesn't care if we watch it or not. It will keep on being beautiful, even if no one bothers to look at it." -Gene Amole

Topic 14: Sweet Flood

If you were watching the weather one morning, and the familiar face of the local weather lady came onto the screen and warned you about taking a certain way to work, because there was a flood of molasses in the way, would you believe her? I probably wouldn't. The funny thing is, if that were to happen, it wouldn't be the first time. On January 15, 1919 a section of Boston, Massachusetts was flooded. Not by water, like you would think, but molasses. This

huge tidal wave occurred when a tank holding the sweet stuff exploded, sending 2.3 million gallons of molasses into the streets.

If someone didn't know what molasses was they may think that a flood of it isn't so weird.

But I'll explain what molasses is. Molasses is a sweet black substance that often substitutes for sugar, and is super sticky. It's often used in place of sugar, so imagine a sticky liquid form of sugar that's black. Alright, now we can move on.

On Commercial Street in Boston, there was a 50 foot tall steel tank that held, you guessed it, molasses. The owners of the 2.3 million gallons of molasses was the United States Industrial Alcohol. They took regular shipments of molasses from the Caribbean and used them to produce liquor. The structure was built in 1915. Allegedly, at least one USIA employee warned that the structure was unsound and dangerous, but outside of recalculating, the company took little action

regarding the warning.

Imagine, you're walking one morning in Boston, and a wave of molasses comes surging towards you at upwards of 25 miles per hour. Naturally, you wouldn't be able to stop it - and it's not water, it's much thicker. Swimming probably wouldn't have been a viable option - so anyone unfortunate enough to be close to the waves of the sticky stuff drowned in it. There were 21 people who were unfortunate enough to lose their lives, and the molasses was strong enough to sweep buildings off of their foundation.

There was upside of 100\$ million modern dollars in damage to only property alone. There was another additional 150 people who were injured in the flood.

As the cleanup crews were pulling survivors and victims from the goo, they realized that cleaning up would not be an easy task at all. Over 80,000 hours were spent

on cleanup alone! After the event, naturally, people started wanting to blame someone on the event. The favorite target of most early 20th century blame games were anarchists. The company claimed that since the molasses was used in a way of government, anarchists detonated the tank with a bomb. Modern studies have found that the tank walls were both too thin and that the steel was too brittle to withstand the amount of molasses.

This was definitely history - 21 people died. If you hadn't heard of this event before, and someone told you about it, you may think they're crazy. But some hot summer days on the boston streets, it's said you can still smell molasses.



Little Princes Author Comes to WKCTC

On March 28, a long-awaited event took place at West Kentucky Community and Technical College. Conor Grennan, author of the New York Times bestseller Little Princes, came to the college to talk about his book. Little Princes is WKCTC's ninth One Book Read. On March 29, he gave the same presentation during the school day to local high school students.

Little Princes is the true story of Grennan's journey to Nepal, a war-torn, mountainous country in Southeast Asia. He becomes a volunteer at an orphanage to justify his trip to Asia. Not knowing the first thing about children, he struggles to find common ground with the orphans. He gradually becomes more and more attached,

and vows to return to his young friends after his first stint in Nepal. When he does return, he discovers the war to have gotten much worse, and is shocked to learn that the orphans he cares for are not orphans at all; rather, they are young victims of human trafficking. Conor is compelled to do something to help, and takes steps to somehow reunite the children with their families. It is a story of bravery, morality, and faith in the midst of a dangerous and sometimes deadly conflict.


During his presentation, Grennan was candid about his motivation for doing what he did. "It's not like I always dreamed about going to Nepal and opening up my own orphanage. I was there, I saw what was happening, and I had to do something. I promise you, if you had been in my situation, you would have done the same," he told his audience. However, he trekked on foot through the mountains of Nepal to several remote villages to find children's families with nothing but some pictures, information, and hope.

Grennan's story isn't all danger and sacrifice, though. In both the book and in his presentation, he includes several anecdotes about the children he took care of. Their hilarity and fascination with the western world makes the story much more happy than one would expect of a book about Nepali orphans. He gives a human face (or several faces) to a problem that is so faroff to his audience that awareness is nearly non-existent here in the United States. Awareness, he says, is the biggest help anyone can offer his organization, Next Generation Nepal. Monetary donations are

appreciated, but according to Grennan, the number one way to help is through spreading awareness.

Meeting Conor Grennan was a true privilege for me, as I want to be an author one day. He is a talented writer and a selfless person, even if he may deny that his actions were heroic. I was nervous to meet a writer whom I respected so much, but in speaking with him faceto-face, I was immediately put at ease by his friendly and easy-going nature. His tone in the book is the same as in real life. It was an honor to meet him and to hear his story firsthand.

2. Camp Counselor-ing



Willy Wonka and the Chocolate Factory

WARNING: While the author has taken painstaking efforts to leave this review spoiler-free, the definition of a "spoiler" is subjective, and everyone has different thoughts and opinions on this. Please read at your own risk.

There are some films that have such a bearing on our culture, such an impact on our childhood, that it's owed recognition as one of the greatest of all time. The 1971 classic Willy Wonka and the Chocolate Factory is one of those films. Directed by Mel Stuart, it was based on Roald Dahl's 1964 children's book Charlie and the Chocolate Factory. While it wasn't a huge success at the time of its release, Willy Wonka has since taken its place as one of the greatest films in history.

Charlie Bucket (Peter Ostrum) comes from an extremely poor family. He lives with his mother and four bedridden grandparents, and he finds a confidant in his Grandpa Joe (Jack Albertson). They live in the same town as the famous candy maker Willy Wonka, but his factory has been closed for several years due to competitors sending in spies to learn Wonka's secrets. No one has gone in or out of the factory since the gates closed. Suddenly, Wonka makes an announcement that shocks the world: he has put Golden Tickets in five random Wonka Bars across the world, and the lucky winners will be invited to tour his factory and receive a lifetime supply of chocolate. Charlie knows he won't win, but he continues hoping for the best. He ends up winning the fifth ticket. He decides to bring Grandpa Joe. Willy Wonka (Gene Wilder) himself brings the five children and their parents around the factory, showing them around and eliminating them one by one, until a sole winner is left.

The best part about this film is the visuals and effects. Granted, this is the 1970's, so the effects are a little dated, but the visuals add to the timelessness of the film, especially in the Fudge Room of the factory. The outside world is dull and gritty, but inside the factory, the environment is fun and magical. That is, except for the infamous Tunnel Scene. where all sorts of scary imagery is shown that might scare children and even unnerve adults. There are all kinds of twists and turns in the factory, and you never know whether is something is really how it seems, or iust an illusion.

The songs are classics that everyone knows and loves. "Pure Imagination" has a legacy of its own outside of the film, and "I've Got a Golden Ticket" can be stuck in your head for days after you watch it. The Oompa-Loompas' songs are all pretty similar and yet unique to the present situation.

When author Roald Dahl saw this film, he was dissatisfied with the fact that the film's focus was more on Willy Wonka than it was on Charlie. That's easy to see why. Gene Wilder truly steals the show in this. He portrays Wonka as a kindly but sarcastic mystery that is very sure of himself but causes others to doubt

his actions. Wonka makes candy because "that's what he was born to do", without an in-depth backstory or reason. That's what makes Willy Wonka a great character. He's a dreamer, but not air-headed: sarcastic, but not mean-spirited; intelligent; but not pompous. There's a perfect balance. Gene Wilder's performance isn't to say Peter Ostrum was bad in his role of Charlie. In fact, he was very good. He was only twelve vears old at the time, and he portravs Charlie as a real kid.

He's a good person at heart, but that doesn't stop him from feeling jealousy or bitterness or hopelessness at times. That's something everybody can relate to, no matter what age. This was Ostrum's only film role ever; he later became a veterinarian.

Most everyone has seen this movie, but may not remember it very well because it's been so long. It's worth a rewatch. Willy Wonka and the Chocolate Factory is one of those rare timeless, 100% feel-


